# SUMMER ROLL:

There has always been an excitement associated with the summer that has fostered a surge in pop music. A good percentage of the year's hits usually aurface in late spring with intentions of aiding sales during the carefree vacation months. The album purchasing crowd has more time to listen to radio and albums, often blessed with summer jobs and summer paychecks.

The summer of 1980 did not produce the kind of music we were made accostomed to hearing in the three previous summers. While Blotto's 'Lifeguard' was a welcomed substitution for the innoccuous 'Ring My Bell', those heavy rock 'n roll albums, for the most part, were not there. We'll just have to wait till

Christmas for Bruce and Steely Dan.

The lack of those 'heavies' forced radio stations into overplaying whatever new quality vinyl came their way. It also forced them into featuring oldies shows glorifying past summer successes. Southside Johnny's Love is a Sacrifice represents their most populr effort to date. The album, and the band deserve this long overdue acceptance. For a long period of time they spent their energy in the shasow of Springsteen, but have proven to be capable of achieving their own identity. The band's production both live and on record is highly dependent on a vibrant horn section. Their prolific release of material and intense concert performances satiate rock 'n rollers' appetites, whereas Springsteen has succeeded in embittering fans who've been dissappointed through long album-less years.

Here are some thoughts on more of the summer's releases: Pete Townsend's Empty Glass: Rock 'n roll's genius gives us another sweet breath of fresh air, and kept many of us believing that Summer '80 had potential. Mink This could be his 'Damn The Deville: Torpedos'. 'Savoir Faire', 'This Could Be The Night' make Le Chat Blue Summer '80's most underrated effort. Rolling Stones, Emotional Rescue: In the shadow of Some Girls, lots of good fun music-take it for what its worth. If not for 'Down in the Whole' and 'All About You' it would have been a scandal. Graham Parker, The Up Escalator: Despite what the critics say, this one is phenomenal. Once again, Graham runs the gamut, from heartwreching ballads, ('The Beating of Another Heart'), to anguish and pain, ('Empty Lies'), and resurfaces again, vibrant and alive with 'Endless Night', Parker wins again! Guest appearance from the Boss, too.

# QUICK CUTS

Bob Marley & The Wailers, Uprising: This past summer, reggae fans and fans of all music were blessed with the new release from Bob Marley. Recorded on Warner's Island Label, Marley's rhythmic vocals and prophetic style comes forth with classic rastafarian spirit. The message is clear and is contained in the song 'Work'; which proclaims: "We can make it work". This they do quite well.

Roxy Music, Flesh and Blood: Innovators from the start, Roxy pulls another ace from their deck of highly-stylized repertoire. Flesh and Blood succeeds in bringing about a mix of sounds, without sacrificing Roxy's identifying trademark of textured, leveled production. Ferry, Manzanera, and MacKay, sans Paul Thompson keep the ears listening throughout. Jeff Beck, There and Back: After four years Beck hasn't changed much. While the album is still worthwhile there is no departure from Wired. After a year maybe We'd be happy with There and Back. But after four years someone of Beck's talent should have developed something a bit more diverse than this further funky recording. Has he left rock 'n roll forever or can we expect more funk and groovein '84? Peter Gabriel: Clearly the evidence has been presented. At the time of his departure from Genesis, many wondered about Peter Gabriel's ability to work within the rock genre. Here, on his third solo effort, he has found a medium between his dramatic vignettes and the rhythm texture of New Wave. This album is a must for followers and new fans

Summer '80 was a weird one musically. The quality rock 'n roll was there, but much of it went unnoticed as far as AM or FM 'hits'. Luckily there are still some radio stations around who don't depend exclusively on the heavies and are comfortable with good ole' unhyped music. Bunny Brunel is soon to release an album of his own in this country. Recorded in France with such notables as Chick Corea, Andre Ceccarelli, percussionist, and Nicol Villa, vocalist, the album will be called Touch, and offers many beautiful jazz compositions.

Speaking with Bunny, one can feel the warmth that is part of him and his music. He will be an important artist for the years to come. Listen to early evening jazz on WCDB and you will hear the music of Bunny Brunel, or Miles Davis, or Pat Metheny, or John Coletrane, or the Art Ensemble of Chicago, or Weather Report, or nearly any other jazz artist you can think of. Most American rock 'n roll fans have always looked to England for the best in popular music. After all, the Jewel in the Sea gave us the Beatles and Stones, then Cream, Yes, and later The Sex Pistols, Clash, and Pretenders. What these "Grass is greener" fans forget is that the Fab Four looked to Buddy Holly and Bob Dylan for inspiration, Art-Rockers were blues-based, and the first 'punks' were Lou Reed, and then the Ramone brothers.

But there is something very exciting about a country that gives The Jam number-one hit singles, that imports a Dutch "Bank Robber" single because The Clash weren't planning on releasing the song domestically for six weeks, that has five weekly rock TV shows, and has stars like Pete Townshend and Elvis Costello appearing on radio shows each week.

Yet England is no rock music Utopia. There is one "progressive" rock show in stereo in the whole country. The number one song is as often a song by Abba or Cliff Richard, or worse, a disco number, as it is a r&r tune. During a great sale, you can buy an album for as little as 9 dollars. Usually they're 10-12 a piece.

American imports go for 17. Hence the British reliance on singles. At 2.50, they are still not cheap, but only cost the same as admission to a small rock pub. Novelty songs, (like "Captain Beaky and his Band", by Keith Michel), figure heavily into the British music business, as do specially packaged EPs., 7-inch records that play at 45 or 33rpm, 'extended play' singles usually feature the "plug song", (side A, as it were), an album cut, (traditionally weak in the US, often not bad in the UK), and one or two more songs recorded live, or in some other way generally not found on an album. Lately special packages have included double sleeve two disc singles, giving the purchaser upwards of 6 songs for his pound fifteen.

Despite the large amount of creativity in such a small space, Britain doesn't even offer a new rock musician as much of a chance as the US. The violent and abusive rock press turns on each star in turn, in a "backlash" that usually follows the artist's third successful single. But even a big success is not so big. With Britain and its economy so small, a huge seller moves several hundred thousand records. And artists like Graham Parker are chased out of the country. He toured England to support his failing Squeezing Out Sparks, and later said, "I was so dissappointed. And then we went to America and suddenly we had a new audience. It had opened out for us and the record did better, and to me this was an up, whereas England wasn't." Import English records are nice, but a rock fan can't lose perspective.

#### THE SOURCE

While music is an itegral part of WCDB's makeup, 91FM News is on the move as well. Local news is carried several times daily, providing updates on campus events, as well as locally and statewide. On all other hours, international and national news is broadcast.

But "just the news" is not enough. WCDB has an important obligation to look at public affairs of interest to the community. Our answer is On The Podium. Every Tuesday night from 8 to 9pm, we present not only information, but also a glimpse at the personalities of those people making news. Host Pete Sgro and his staff are always searching for those stories that people find interesting, yet do not know how to find on their own. Our premire show presented listeners with such newsmakers as Jewish Defense League founder Meir Kahane, and Katherine Kennedy, niece of Senator Edward Kennedy. On The Podium was also ready as we presented phone-in segments and interviews with those involved in our Student Association controversy. We will continue to stay on top those events of primary interest to the community in the coming semester.

Finally, this fall we will undertake extensive coverage of the 1980 elections, both on the national and local level. Correspondents will be stationed in New York for the Senate races, around town for local elections, as well as indepth reporting about the Presidential contest. No matter what the story, we'll be there to bring you the news on 91FM. Listen in and stay

It is often difficult for a British band to be successful in the US because it is claimed their sound is too British. The Jam, one of the most popular acts in England, have been experiencing this problem throughout their career. However, this will not be a concern for **The Vapors**, who, although very heavily influenced by The Jam, lack Paul Weller's pretentiousness and have steered clear of that British sound. This all adds to the potential success of The Vapors in America.

But the real secret is that New Clear Days, (a very satirical title-say it to yourself quickly and you'll understand), is easily one of the best debut albums this year. The Vapors play rock 'n roll with pop undertones which will please both categories of listeners. "News At Ten", "Prisoners", (their first single), and "Bunkers" show off the bands energy, talent, and cleverness which was originally heard in "Turning Japanese", their latest single.


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
